A Pastoral Reflection on MLK Jr Day, January 17, 2022

“I have almost reached the regrettable conclusion that the Negro’s great stumbling block in the stride toward freedom is not the White Citizen’s Council-er or the Ku Klux Klanner, but the white moderate who is more devoted to ‘order’ than to justice; who prefers a negative peace which is the absence of tension to a positive peace which is the presence of justice; who constantly says, ‘I agree with you in the goal you seek, but I can’t agree with your methods of direct action;’ who paternalistically feels he can set the timetable for another man’s freedom; who lives by the myth of time and who constantly advises the Negro to wait until a ‘more convenient season.’ Lukewarm acceptance is much more bewildering than outright rejection.”

~ Martin Luther King Jr, “Letter from Birmingham Jail,” April 16, 1963



For me – a white pastor raised in the suburbs of Philadelphia in the ‘60’s – it has always seemed disingenuous to approach the topic of racism with any sense of authority. Especially when speaking with a white congregation. I know precious little about being a person of color in our nation. Or how to unpack the connection between the church and its long history of participation in racist acts. I ponder what it means to live alongside the poorest large city in America, and how poverty intersects with the color of a person’s skin.

Some years ago I began to explore what I did not know about structural racism. (I had to learn what that meant). I became aware that I was unaware of the biases I inherited throughout my childhood, and how overwhelming that awareness can be. But feeling overwhelmed and giving in to that feeling are two different things. I concluded that none of us can afford to allow our feelings of confusion and defensiveness and fear to rule the day. There is simply too much at stake.

I share this little bit of my truth with you because I want you to know I am still learning. And because I feel a responsibility, as a white pastor in the Philadelphia Presbytery, to let all of us know we are not off the hook. We need to do the work of engaging this reality. Where to begin?

How about with Matthew 25: “‘Come, you that are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world; for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me.’ Jesus’ command has been translated into the Matthew 25 Initiative by our own presbytery, whose excellent livestream series, “Being Matthew 25” begins on the PCUSA Facebook page on January 20 at 1 pm. Anyone can join to learn more about becoming a Matthew 25 congregation.¹

As we celebrate the life and work of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., I invite us to consider what a historically Black congregation calls “MLK Day.” They’ve named it “Beloved Community Day,” remembering Dr. King’s goal of building a beloved community through reconciliation and redemption.² Let us do our part in building that community (See the following pages for additional resources).

Minute for Mission: *The Food Center at Morrisville Presbyterian Church*

Some of our NPC Mission envelope/online offerings are designated to support the Food Center at Morrisville Presbyterian Church (website: www.mpcusa.org/food-center), as well as non-perishable food donations.

Our church is committed to meeting the physical needs of our community through a strong partnership with the Food Center. We have responded to the increasing rates of those needing food assistance during the pandemic with quarterly food drives, benefiting those in the Lower Bucks County and Trenton, NJ areas.

In addition to the quarterly food drives being held at Northampton Presbyterian Church for delivery to the Food Center, a table and basket are available in our narthex. Please drop off your non-perishable donations any Sunday when you are attending worship. All items are welcome, but if you would like suggested items to purchase, these are some: canned beans, canned fruit and vegetables, canned meat entrée (stew, chili), canned soup, canned tuna fish, cereal, macaroni and cheese in box, milk (evaporated or shelf stable), pasta, peanut butter or jelly in plastic jar, rice, spaghetti sauce in plastic jar.

The mission of the Food Center is to provide supplemental food assistance to food-insecure families in Lower Bucks County and the greater Trenton area in a caring and respectful manner. They have been doing this since 1997. Any individual or family residing in this service area may visit the Food Center for assistance. The Food Center is entirely volunteer operated and is dependent on donations of food and money from the community. Based on family size, clients receive a variety of fresh fruits and vegetables, meats, eggs, dairy products, bakery items, personal care items and household items, as well as diapers and pet food.

“Ways to Help the Food Center at Morrisville Presbyterian Church” – Our next Drive-Thru Food Drive is Monday, January 17th from 10 AM to noon. RAIN DATE Sunday, January 23rd from 11:30 AM to 1:30 PM.

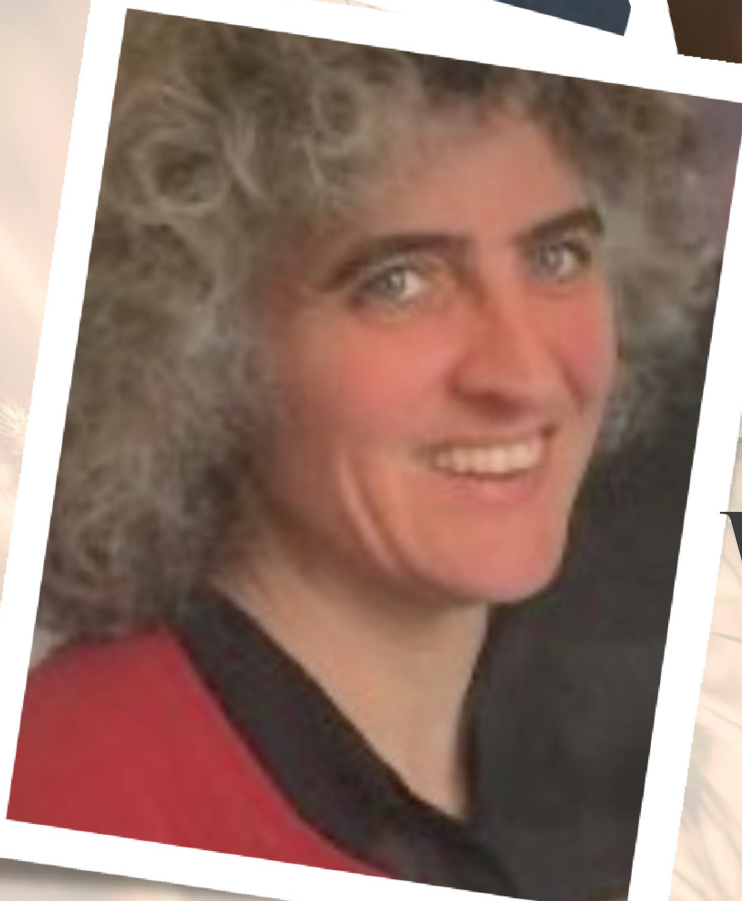
