NPC and Project Regeneration

Following several visioning retreats and a period of discernment, NPC has decided to partner with the Presbyterian Foundation and its Project Regeneration strategic planning initiative. Members of Session, the Finance team, and several congregational members are working with Rev. Rose Niles from the Foundation to discern what the next chapter will hold for NPC.

This will be a long-term project as the Project Regeneration Team (consisting of Andy Chen, Cathy Cocchia, Steve Cocchia, Corinne Kauermann, Sharon Melsky, Kathie Pisciella, Jessica Stehr, and Dana Winslow) reads a book called "The Sailboat Church" by Joan Gray. We will also be praying deeply for the Holy Spirit to guide us on what should be the next phase of NPC's life as a church. All options are on the table: staying our current course; reinventing our ministry and our physical space; partnering with another church, through a merger or by sharing a pastor; or possibly even closing. But the key is to hear God's Word through the Holy Spirit to see where we should be going.

The fundamental premise of Project Regeneration and "The Sailboat Church" (from the PCUSA ecommerce website) is that most churches are either "rowboat" churches or "sailboat" churches. Which is NPC? "Rowboat churches depend largely on human effort. When church budgets shrink and membership declines, rowboat churches frantically row harder against a current, often frustrated and disappointed at their efforts. Sailboat churches, on the other hand, take up the oars, hoist sails, and rely on the Holy Spirit to guide them."

As we work through the process, we will bring regular updates to the congregation, as well as invite input and participation from you. Please pray for the team as they work to discern what God has in store for us in the future, and please pray for your own discernment of whom the Holy Spirit is calling us to be, and what It is calling us to do.

This coming Monday, November 11, is Veterans Day, a day set aside to honor all military veterans who have served in the U.S. Armed Forces. One group that is worthy of mention on this special day is the Navajo Code Talkers, who are honored in a special exhibit at Window Rock, the seat of government of the Navajo Nation in Arizona.

I have been privileged to visit Window Rock twice in the past two years, most recently with my husband, who is a veteran of the Air Force. Though we both find the story of the Code Talkers compelling, it carries special meaning for those who have served behind the scenes as communications specialists in wartime.

The Code Talkers used their knowledge of the Navajo language to create an unbreakable code that played a crucial role in securing victory for U.S. forces in the Pacific Theater during World War II. Their courage and dedication helped save countless lives and contributed significantly to the military's efforts during one of history's darkest periods.

This past September, our group of Americans for Native Americans were welcomed by Theresa, daughter of John Kinsel (the oldest living Code Talker) at the hotel that was our home base while serving at The Community Pantry in Gallup, NM. Theresa is a ball of energy who shared her father's story, as well as the sad news that he was on hospice at that time. He passed away in October at the age of 107, having served his country in an extraordinary and exemplary fashion.

At his funeral, John Kinsel was celebrated as a symbol of bravery and cultural pride. His passing marks the end of an era, as he was one of the last remaining code talkers, leaving behind a profound legacy of service, sacrifice, and love for his homeland. That is the same legacy honored by all who currently serve and the rich inheritance of all of us who live in freedom thanks to every one of our veterans. This Veterans Day, won't you pause to reflect on the many contributions to our lives selflessly made by those who have served uniform?
