CLG QUESTIONS: *Psalm 98:4-9 & John 15:9-17*

- 1. The Psalms were Israel's "hymnbook," meant to be sung in worship. Today we often preach what was meant to be sung. In Psalm 98, the psalmist gives us an imperative: sing to the Lord a new song. He or she doesn't stop with human worshippers equipped with voices and instruments: the psalm goes on to address the sea, the floods, the hills. All of creation is commanded to join in the song of worship. How does this psalm preach to you?
- 2. There are times in our lives when a psalm such as Psalm 98 might sound like a clanging cymbal, a loud cacophony that does not resonate with the state of our souls. At such times, if we flip a few pages in either direction, we will find a psalm of lamentation. The gift of the Psalms is that they cover nearly every human emotion we might ever know, including some that seem too impolite or gruesome to be included in sacred scripture. Which psalm of lamentation do you find comforting and why?

- 3. In the New Testament, chapters 14–17 of the Gospel of John are known as the Farewell Discourse given by Jesus on the night before his crucifixion to eleven of his disciples immediately after the conclusion of the Last Supper in Jerusalem. In chapter 15 Jesus says that "the greatest love is to lay down one's life for one's friends" (John 15:13). How do you see that happening in our congregation? In our community? How are love and generosity intertwined?
- 4. How do you "find your home" in Christ's love? What "dwelling time" can you take this week?
